The Story of the Bible

"God, who at various times and in various ways spoke in time past to the fathers by the prophets, has in these last days spoken to us by His Son..." (Hebrews 1:1-2)

From the very beginning God has been speaking to each of

his creation. He has spoken though the words of the prophets, through the examples of the faithful, through the history of his people, and finally through his Son. The Bible tells his story.

Genesis is the beginning. The first words of the Bible intro-

duce us to God: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." This is God's world. He has made it and everything in it. He made it to be inhabited with people and other creatures. From the beginning he taught his creation how to live on this earth

Not long after Adam and Eve were created, they decided not to believe God. Instead they believed a lie and did not do what God had told them. The result of that disobedience was a cursed earth and death. They could not keep living in God's world because they would not believe and do as God required.

Starting from the announcement of the consequence of Adam and Eve's rebellion in Genesis 3, the Bible tells the story of God's reaching out to his creation to bring them back to him. Genesis continues with examples of those who were faithful and obeyed such as Noah and Abraham and the blessings they received and will receive. It also tells what happened to those who insisted on rebellion such as that of Cain and the people of Noah's time.

After the time of Noah, God called a man named Abraham to leave his home and family and go to a place he did not know. Because Abraham believed and obeyed God made several promises to him, promises that impact all of us. Blessings would come through him.

"I will make you into a great nation and I will bless you; I will make your name great, and you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and whoever curses you I will curse; and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you." (Genesis 12:1-3)

From this man Abraham came the nation of Israel, God's people with a special purpose:

See, I have taught you decrees and laws as the LORD my God commanded me,

so that you may follow them in the land you are entering to take possession of it. Observe them carefully, for this will show your wisdom and understanding to the nations, who will hear about all these decrees and say, "Surely this great nation is a wise and understanding people." What other nation is so great as to have their gods near them the way the LORD our God is near us whenever we pray to him? And what other nation is so great as to have such righteous decrees and laws as this body of laws I am setting before you today? (Deut 4:5-8)

After 400 years as slaves in Egypt, Israel was freed and led by God through the work of his servant Moses, through the desert and to the land that was promised to Abraham and

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his family. God gave them other leaders such as Joshua and Samuel and Deborah and King David. The Bible history tells the remarkable stories of the lives of these leaders.

From the nation of Israel came the prophets of old such as Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Daniel. They were sent by God to give warnings and instructions to the people. Today we see their inspired writings in the Old Testament. To us they also warn, instruct and inspire.

In all this history there were a few that listened to the message from God and were faithful to him. Many more were rebellious. The consequence of their rebellion was defeat at the hands of their enemies and expulsion from the promised land. In his mercy, however, God promised that a time of repentance and restoration would come:

"'For I will take you out of the nations; I will gather you from all the countries and bring you back into your own land. I will sprinkle clean water on you, and you will be clean; I will cleanse you from all your impurities and from all your idols. I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws. You will live in the land I gave your forefathers; you will be my people, and I will be your God. (Ezekiel 36:24-29)

So God promised more than to just bring his people back to the land. He promised that they will again be a nation with one king, that he will be their God and live with them:

"'My servant David will be king over them, and they will all have one shepherd. They will follow my laws and be careful to keep my decrees. They will live in the land I gave to my servant Jacob, the land where your fathers lived. They and their children and their children's children will live there forever, and David my servant will be their prince forever. I will make a covenant of peace with them; it will be an everlasting covenant. I will establish them and increase their numbers, and I will put my sanctuary among them forever. My dwelling place will be with them; I will be their God,

and they will be my people. Then the nations will know that I the LORD make Israel holy, when my sanctuary is among them forever." (Ezekiel 37:24-28)

Although there was a partial fulfillment of these promises when some of the people of Israel, now known as the Jews, returned from their Babylonian captivity to Judah and Jerusalem during the time of Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther, and Haggai, the promises were far from completed.

About 2,000 years ago the people of Israel were in expectation of the beginning of the fulfillment of these promises. In preparation for the coming of their deliverer, an angel appeared to the priest Zechariah announcing the birth of his son who was to be called John. He would prepare the way for the coming Messiah. When the child was born, Zechariah praised God with these words:

"Praise be to the Lord, the God of Israel, because he has come and has redeemed his people.

He has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David, as he said through his holy prophets of long

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ago, salvation from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us—

To show mercy to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant, the oath he swore to our father Abraham:

To rescue us from the hand of our enemies, and to enable us to serve him without fear in holiness and righteousness before him all our days.

And you, my child, will be called a prophet of the Most High; for you will go on before the Lord to prepare the way for him, To give his people the knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins,

Because of the tender mercy of our God, by which the rising sun will come to us from heaven

To shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the path of peace." (Luke 1:67-79)

Of the descendants of this man Abraham, the Messiah was born, Son of God and Son of Man. Jesus came teaching and preaching repentance and the coming kingdom. Through preaching and teaching, with signs and wonders of healing and wisdom, Jesus showed the way to life eternal for all those who believe and obey him. In his life he always did what pleased his Father showing us the example of love and obedience:

but the world must learn that I love the Father and that I do exactly what Father has commanded me. (John 14:31) Before long, the world will not see me anymore, but vou will see me. Because I live, you also will live. On that day you will realize that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in vou. Whoever has my commands and obeys them, he is the one who loves me. He who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love him and show myself to him." (John 14:19-21)

Through this Jesus, through his life, his death, his resurrection from the dead, all the promises of God have their fulfillment. It is through Jesus that our hearts are changed; it is through Jesus that we are for-

given and cleansed, and it is through Jesus that we are moved to believe and obey our Father.

The New Testament book of Acts tells the history of the spread of the preaching of the good news concerning Jesus' triumph over sin and death. The news first was preached in Jerusalem to the Jewish people but spread quickly through the of rest the world. Whether Jew or Gentile, it makes no difference. All are commanded to come to God through belief and obedience in Jesus Christ:

Peter replied, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off — for all whom the Lord our God will call." (Acts 2:38-39)

This is the beginning of the complete fulfillment of God's promises to Abraham and to all the faithful but there is more. It is promised that Jesus

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will return to this earth:

"Men of Galilee," they said,
"why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from
you into heaven, will come
back in the same way you have
seen him go into
heaven." (Acts 1:11)

It is also promised that when he returns, he will raise from the dead those who have followed him:

For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: (1 Thessalonians 4:16)

There is a word of warning though. When Jesus returns there will be a judgment. Some will be judged worthy to be part of God's plan but others will not.

I charge *you* therefore before God and the Lord Jesus Christ, who will judge the living and the dead at His appearing and His kingdom: (2 Timothy 4:1)

In agreement with the prophecies of the Old Testament, the Bible closes with prophecies and promises that when Jesus

returns to the earth he will return as King. He will rule the world in justice and righteousness. The earth will be filled with the glory of God.

Rejoice greatly, O Daughter of Zion! Shout, Daughter of Jerusalem!

See, your king comes to you, righteous and having salvation,

gentle and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

I will take away the chariots from Ephraim and the war-horses from Jerusalem,

and the battle bow will be broken.

He will proclaim peace to the nations. His rule will extend from sea to sea

and from the River to the ends of the earth. (Zechariah 9:9-10)

For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD,

as the waters cover the sea. (Hab. 2:14)

Then the seventh angel sounded: And there were loud voices in heaven, saying, "The kingdoms of this world have become *the kingdoms* of our Lord and of His Christ, and He shall reign forever and ever!" (Rev 11:15-16)

The Bible tells the story of God's plan and purpose for his creation. We have never seen God, but through the pages of the Bible God's love and compassion, his mercy and his righteousness, his eternity and his power are made known to us. We have never seen his son Jesus, but we come to know Jesus through the writings of the prophets, the psalmist, and the apostles. Someday, when Jesus does return to this earth, we shall see him. In fact the Bible says that when he returns "every eye shall see him". The Bible tells us how to prepare for that time when God's promises are fulfilled, when Jesus returns as king of the whole earth.

So pick up the Book. Day by day read and mediate over the words of God:

For this is what the LORD says — he who created the heavens,

He is God;

He who fashioned and made the earth, he founded it:

He did not create it to be empty, but formed it to be inhabited —

He says: "I am the LORD, and there is no other. (Isaiah 45:18)
